EHDI

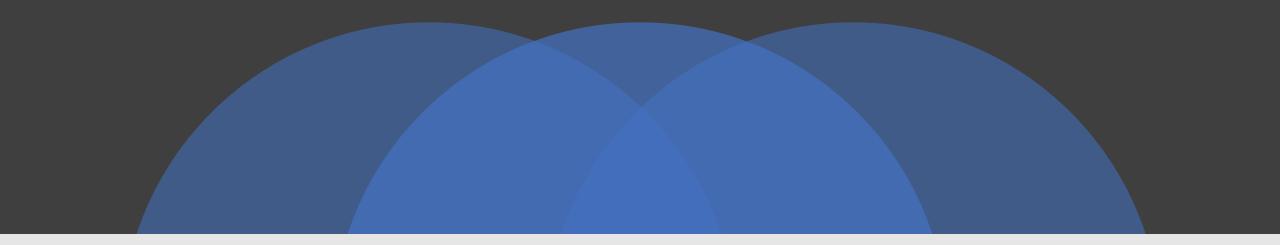
- Public health program in state agency
- Active surveillance
- Data collection, analysis, evaluation
- Educate the public and providers
- Mobilize partnerships
- Policy development
- Promote and enforce legal requirements (screening!)
- Workforce development




Guide By Your Side

- Family based organization, run by board of volunteers
- Educate parents and care takers
- Unbiased, informational and emotional support
- Emphasis on personal experience
- Training in communication and grief
- Advocacy and support
- Build community connections and fostering relationships





What makes our collaboration unique?



Direct referrals – how's that even possible?

- History of GBYS program coordinator role
- Assumption/philosophy of value of parent support for families at a difficult time
- Referral module created in system so audiologists can refer at time of reporting
- Referrals are sent with no PHI, only code used to access the specific record
- Parent and provider receive letter from EHDI with info about GBYS
- Requires trust from audiology community for them to initiate referrals
- Legal opinion about referring and sharing information

Access to the EHDI data system

- Supports a seamless experience for families
- Possible b/c of role-based access to specific cases and fields (minimum data necessary)
- Supported by requirements of parent mentors:
 - Annual trainings 1) Privacy and Security, 2) Mandatory Reporter
 - Background check required
 - Confidentiality waiver signed
 - Training and on-demand assistance
- Legal opinion about minimum data necessary

Worlds Collide: Working together from very different perspectives

- Find an organization with a shared goal (Hands & Voices near you!)
- Engage in crucial conversations
- Keep short accounts
- Be honest
- Value one another's strengths, differences, and input
- Be willing to redefine the relationship
- Don't make assumptions communicate!
- Expect and watch for integrity, stewardship, trustworthiness and accountability

Contract Scope of Work

- Family contact expectations
- Participate as member of Advisory Committee
- Collaborate to increase family participation
- Leadership training for parents
- Consult on family and provider communications
- Events and trainings for families
- Reciprocate invitation to OR GBYS annual training
- Collaborate with OCCYSHN on SPoC
- Partner to conduct a parent survey of the EHDI system
- Assess opportunities for Deaf mentor services
- Ensure all parent guides have required training, background check, confidentiality agreement, etc.

Benefits for Families...

 Authentic connections made by parent guides allows for "filling in the gaps" and "finding" children

 Peer to peer connection supports healthy emotions, which in turn creates compliance within systems (home visits, phone calls, texts)

• Early Intervention is explained by parent guides clearly and positively to every family

Support network for families is created

You have inspired me beyond belief to think...that bringing people together IS possible.



Benefits for EHDI

- Authentic parent voice
- Community level connections and support for families
- Grounds the program in the family experience
- Actualize our values through investment in community partner and family service
- Case finding for late onset and progressive losses
- Reinforce messages about importance of early intervention
- Collaborator in reaching and supporting families

Benefits for GBYS

- Facilitated referrals by audiologists to GBYS program
- Access to minimum data necessary for outreach
- Platform to document guide contacts in EHDI IS
- No need to duplicate data entry
- Technical assistance re: data system development and modifications
- On-demand reports to guide "next steps" for families, active caseload, etc.
- Opportunity to coordinate with rest of child's EHDI team
