TIPS FOR CREATING A DEAF/HARD OF HEARING FRIENDLY HOME ENVIRONMENT

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INTRODUCTION

- Roughly 2-3 out of every 1,000 babies in the US are born with hearing loss (NIDCD, 2016)
 - Over 90% of these families have NO familiarity with hearing loss nor how to provide support in the home
- Many challenging communication situations within the homes
- Hearing children learn language naturally
 - D/HH children don't have this luxury
 - Struggle from inadequate visual/auditory access to language
 - Miss out on most communications during typical family interactions
 - Frustration, isolation and inadequacy feelings

- GOAL: Help create a home environment conducive to D/HH children REGARDLESS of their communication mode
 - Increased language exposure
 - Bigger vocabulary growth
 - Inclusion
 - Positive family relationships
 - Independence
- Tips are NOT comprehensive but will help your awareness of the home surroundings to best support your child
- Explore lighting, accessible communication, incidental learning opportunities, ways to gain their attention, and fostering independence



LIGHTING CONSIDERATIONS

- Major impact on effective communication
- Bright windows, lights, or sun
 - Silhouette
 - Difficulty lipreading, seeing signs, facial expressions, gestures, body language
 - Dimly lit rooms
 - Big eye strain

- STRATEGIES:
 - Don't have the child facing the window
 - Move away from the light source
 - Close blinds/drapes if possible
 - Turn on all lights, add lamps if needed



ACCESSIBLE COMMUNICATION TIPS


- Why is this important?
 - Majority of language learning through communication and incidental learning
 - Multiple conversations and background noise a challenge for all
 - Easy to feel frustrated, lost, isolated, and fatigued






COMMUNICATION CONT'D

- How to improve communication at home
 - Reduce background noise or move away

 - Seating arrangements
 - Remove centerpieces/obstacles
 - Round/oval tables
 - L/U shaped couches

 - Get child's visual attention
 - Get down to their level
 - Face them while communicating

COMMUNICATION CONT'D

- Visual access to signs, gestures, facial expressions at ALL times
 - Speak/sign one at a time
 - Make sure mouth/hands are not obstructed
 - Be as close to your child as possible
- Play time
 - If you hear something, explain

COMMUNICATION CONT'D

- Storytime
 - Positioning
 - Remove/turn off/auditory/visual distractions
 - Make it a relatable and tangible experience

- Closed captions
 - On TV/tablet at ALL times!
 - Fosters inclusion, literacy, and language development

- NEVER tell your child, "never mind", "it's not important", "I'll tell you later".

INCIDENTAL LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

- Ability to overhear/see what's being said and learn from it
 - Big part of what happens at home
 - Important for vocabulary, concept development and world knowledge
 - Critical for social interactions, language, and slang
- Challenging for D/HH children
 - Reason why struggle at home/school/community
- Ways to increase incidental learning opportunities
 - Optimal seating arrangements for good visual access to all
 - Optimal lighting conditions
 - Communicate one at a time, help child see who is talking
 - Visual language support/access at ALL times
 - Reduce auditory/visual background clutter
 - FM, Mini Mic, Roger system if using amplification
 - Closed captions




INCIDENTAL LEARNING CONT'D



APPROPRIATE WAYS TO GET ATTENTION

- Can't always see/hear when someone is "calling" you
 - Wave hands/arms
 - Tap shoulder
 - Tap on table if at table
 - Stomp on floors wood
 - Flash lights on/off

FOSTERING INDEPENDENCE IN THE HOME

- Technology provides visual/tactile support
- Decreases dependence on parents/caregivers
- Devices
 - Door bell

A FINAL WORD


- Tips are by no means comprehensive, but it's a good starting point for within the home and beyond
