






Maine Newborn Hearing Screening Data

- 2018 data:
 - 199 babies referred on the newborn hearing screening
 - 137 seen for follow-up testing
 - 23 diagnosed with permanent hearing loss
- 2017 data:
 - 231 babies referred on the newborn hearing screening
 - 180 seen for follow-up testing
 - 21 diagnosed with permanent hearing loss



Maine Audiologists

- Seven Category A sites
 - Defined as facilities providing full diagnostic audiological evaluation for infants birth to 6 months
 - 17 audiologists
- Twenty-one Category B sites
 - Facilities providing audiological testing procedures for children over 6 months of age
 - Includes 7 Category A sites listed above
 - 33 audiologists (includes the 17 audiologists listed above)



Maine Educational Center for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing

- Provides a variety of programs across the state for children who are deaf and hard of hearing and their families, including:
 - Parent-infant-toddler program
 - Bilingual/Bimodal Preschool
 - K-12 Mainstream Program
 - Early Childhood and Family Services Program
 - Public School Outreach Program



MECDHH Relationships


- MECDHH and CDS have a Memorandum of Understanding
 - MECDHH teachers of the deaf embedded in CDS sites across the state
 - MECDHH support of the Hearing Assistive Technology Program
- MECDHH holds the federal HRSA grant for the state of Maine
 - Funds positions supporting the Maine Newborn Hearing Program, including a Parent Consultant and Audiology Consultant





Role of the MECDHH Statewide Educational Audiologist

- Direct support of MECDHH programs, staff, and students
- Providing management and coordination of Child Development Services' Hearing Assistive Technology Program
- Serving as the Audiology Consultant to the Maine Newborn Hearing Program





MECDHH Responsibilities

- Providing direct consultation to itinerant teachers of the deaf and hard of hearing throughout the state, serving students birth to 21
 - Audiology, hearing technology, classroom acoustics
 - Building strengths among team members through training
 - Supporting TODs located throughout the state to better ensure consistency of services provided statewide, regardless of proximity to educational audiologist
- Providing consultation and evaluation to students according to IFSP/IEP determination
- Fitting and verification of remote microphone technology
- Attending IEP and 504 meetings as requested to support the development of appropriate educational plans
- Serving as a member of the Statewide Education and Family Services Coordination Team
- Serving as a member of the Community of Practice

Child Development Services Responsibilities

- Management of the statewide Hearing Assistive Technology program for children enrolled in CDS services
 - Provision of remote microphone systems, hearing aids, and accessories as determined by IFSP/IEP teams
 - Oversight of hearing aid loaner bank program
- Development of audiology service guidelines

 Serving as a liaison between contracted audiology providers and state leadership

Maine Newborn Hearing Program Responsibilities



- Oversight of Pediatric Audiology Workgroup
- Serving as the audiology consultant for MNHP staff, including coordinator and parent consultant
- Revision of state's risk monitoring protocol for progressive hearing loss
- Development of monitoring frequency protocol
- Revision of MNHP pediatric audiology guidelines
- Revision of hearing loss related literature given to families

Pediatric Audiology Workgroup

 All audiologists from Category A and Category B sites, as well as educational audiologists in the state, are invited to each meeting

Purpose of these meetings is to promote collaboration, disseminate pertinent information, and allow providers to stay informed about what is

happening in the community

Other Duties



- Legislative Taskforce for Kindergarten Readiness
 - L.D. 642, "An Act Regarding Kindergarten Readiness for Children Who Are Deaf And Hard of Hearing"
 - Taskforce charged with developing parent portfolio tracking language development against known language milestones, for all children and families regardless of communication modality
- Member, Maine Newborn Hearing Program Advisory Board
- Cytomegalovirus (CMV) workgroup
 - Focus on educating providers and expectant mothers on prevention of CMV
 - Also investigating possibility of targeted screening for CMV in newborns
- Supporting Annual Maine Hands and Voices Conference
 - Audiology track, CEUs

Benefits

- System-level support
- Ease of collaboration across agencies
 - Allows support of families in determining "next steps" for receiving services
 - Supporting students as they transition from early childhood services to Kindergarten
- Able to pull from multiple perspectives to support children and families as well as providers
- Able to serve as a "content area expert" for agencies not currently employing audiologists
 - Trainings, webinars
 - Providing opinions to guide policy development

Challenges/Considerations

- Time!
- Limited direct services with children/families
- Collaboration with many different personalities
- Maintaining positive relationships
- Geography/Distance
- Number of providers
- Being the "problem solver"

Next Steps/Ongoing Work

- Teleaudiology
 - Supporting families outside of southern Maine
 - Improving lost-to-follow-up data in the state
- Investigation of grant funding to support expansion of services
 - Cochlear implant programming
- Continued work developing/refining policies related to pediatric audiology
- Continuing to support growth of pediatric audiologists in the state through consultation, training, and professional development
