Goals for the monthly book club:

- Family-to-family contacts
- Opportunities for family networking
- Provide support on topics facing families during a pandemic / lock-down
- Interaction between hearing families with d/hh/d+/db children to engage with a Deaf Adult
- Connect with families with older d/hh/d+/db children appearing as guest speakers

Creating a shared space providing full access to language:

The book club gatherings are intentionally designed to achieve full access to language and information. It is a collaborative model of Deaf Space and Hearing Space. The priority is teaching by doing.

- See what it looks like to **chat with a deaf person** using multiple communication strategies
- Show how deaf people are leaders and contribute valuable information to discussions
- Demonstrate the ability of deaf people to tell their own story, self-determination, success in life
- Honestly share emotions by being vulnerable while examining life growing-up in a hearing family
- Provide a framework to understand that what works for a hearing child may not work for a deaf child.
- Answer questions for the families on any topic about personal experiences Tracy Duncan

Criteria for the Book Club selections

- **Polling participating families** about their interests, preferred dates/times, topics, and the name of book club
- Selecting books relating to daily needs of participating families
- Giving serious thought to diversity in the book selections
- Setting realistic expectations about keeping-up with reading
- Avoiding biased works to ensure respect for family choice
- Creating a "safe-space" for each participant as they read

Use of Reading Guides

Advanced preparation of a Reading Guide to provide

- Families one month's time to prepare by receipt of both the book & reading guide
- A monthly timeline of chapters and potential topics
- Cohesiveness for the facilitators and interpreters
- Opportunities to expand conversations

Families are prepared to share their life experiences

Reading a few chapters each month

- Allows participants to think about the discussions and how it relates to their life
- Can lead to a paradigm shift that evolves over time
- Enables the families to reflect on what they have read and be prepared to share their thoughts.

Imbedding Strategies for Successful Interaction with their Child

Reading about strategies each month provides participants the occasion to:

- Relate the information to their life and preparing to engage
- Reflect on evolving ideas leading to a paradigm shift
- Ponder their thoughts and insights over a period

Parents are able to network based on their common experiences, thoughts, and sharing resources they find helpful

Strategies facilitators use:

- Highlighting the points parents make and expanding upon them
- Facilitating parent discussions by drawing specifics shared from previous conversations
- Supporting comments with examples and stories
