









Why is Parent-to-Parent Support So Important?


Because of the low incidence of hearing loss, families of children who are D/HH often feel isolated from each other and do not typically have support opportunities in their already established community.

- A way to share information.
- A safe place to brainstorm/express feelings.
- A means of learning practical parenting skills.

What Does Meaningful Parent-to-Parent Support Provide Families?



- A place to validate feelings.
- An increased sense of confidence and empowerment.
- An increased acceptance of the situation and hope for the future.
- An increased capacity to cope.

Why Create a Parent Support Team?

- According to the Family Leadership in Language and Learning (FL3) national family needs assessment survey and a 2018 NC family support survey, families with children who are D/HH report that the most valuable source of support comes from families with a shared experience of having a D/HH child.
- Fostering parent-to parent support is priority area for NC-EHDI.

What is the NC-EHDI Parent Support Team?

A diverse network of parents that provides parent-to-parent support for families that have a child who is D/HH.



Who is on the Parent Support Team?

- Currently six team members.
 - The EHDI Parent Consultant
 - 5 Mentor Parents mothers of children with hearing loss
- Diversity is represented in many ways:
 - Race/Ethnicity
 - Communication Mode
 - Bilingual Mentor Parents (ASL, Spanish)
 - Regions of North Carolina
 - Amplification Used (cochlear implants, hearing aids, none)

Do Mentor Parents Receive Training?

- Yes! A formal training given by the EHDI Parent Consultant.
- Topics covered:
 - -Process for getting families connected.
 - -Privacy issues (HIPPA/FERPA).
 - -How to provide unbiased support.
 Keeping in mind implicit bias, health equity, social determinants of health, and cultural humility.
 - -The importance of listening.
 - -Connecting families to resources.

What is the Role of the Parent Mentor?

Listen

Allow the parent some time to explain their situation, feelings, and struggles.

Share

Tell the family about their own experiences with hearing loss.

Clarify

What does the family want for their child's future? How can they assist them in achieving those goals?

What is the Role of the Parent Mentor?

Answer

Answer questions to the best of their ability or use the provided resource list to direct them to someone else that can.

Connect

Help the family find ways to connect to others in the hearing loss community.



Parent mentors are reminded to be sensitive to parent choice as the family they are supporting may choose a different path than the one they have chosen for their child.

How Do Parents Access the Support Team?

 The EHDI Parent Support Team is collaborating with the Early Learning Sensory Support Program (ELSSP) and early intervention teachers to connect parents to this resource.

- When an ELSSP teacher sees that a family is receptive or has the desire for parent-to-parent support, they help that family get connected by:
 - Calling/Texting the EHDI Parent Consultant together.
 - Getting them in contact with the Parent Consultant via email.

How has Collaborating with ELSSP led to Programming Success?

- Collaborating with ELSSP has allowed our program to be more easily accessible to a wide range of parents.
- Teachers across the entire state know about this resource.
- Since early intervention teachers are the ones that meet with families on a regular basis, they are better equipped to sense when parents need and will be most receptive to parent-to-parent support.

How do Parents Get Connected?

- The Parent Consultant reaches out to the family via their preferred mode of communication in order to:
 - listen to the family's desires.
 - match that family to a parent mentor best suited to help them.




A mentor parent is matched with a family based on what that particular family needs.

Example 1: A family is looking for someone they can meet and spend time with faceto-face.



*Location of the mentor parent would be the most important factor to consider

Example 2: A mom wants someone that can help her find resources for learning ASL.



*A mentor parent who has achieved ASL fluency as an adult would be ideal for this family.

Example 3: A parent wants to talk to someone who can tell them more about cochlear implant surgery.



*This family would be referred to a parent that has a child who has undergone cochlear implant surgery.

- The Parent Consultant will then inform the Parent Mentor that they have been matched with a family.
- The Parent Mentor will be given the family's information and asked to contact them in a timely manner.

What is the EHDI Parent Support Team?

The Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) Parent Support Team is a diverse network of parents that was formed in order to provide parent-to-parent support for families that have a child who is deaf or hard of hearing. Each parent mentor has been trained to provide support for your family in an unbiased way as you and your child navigate the journey of hearing loss. The role of the parent mentor is to listen, help when asked, and connect you to various parent resources available in our state.

What happens next?

- The EHDI Parent Consultant will speak with you via your preferred mode of communication.
- After finding out what kind of support you would like, the Parent Consultant will
 connect you with a parent support team member that is best suited to help you and
 your family.

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Highlights

- The Parent Support Team officially launched in August of 2020.
- In October, after careful review, some adjustments were made in the collaboration and referral process between EHDI and ELSSP.
- In mid-October, a live webinar reintroducing the program was held for parents and early intervention teachers.
- Five (5) successful parent mentor matches have been made.

Next Steps

- In the spring of 2021, NC-EHDI plans to distribute a satisfaction survey to see how we can improve the visibility and accessibility of our program.
- New parents have expressed an interest in being trained as mentor parents as demand for the program grows.
- Continuing education for our parent mentors regarding empathy and the role it plays in successful relationships.
