

Look for the "I Can Sign" ribbon on participant name badges.



Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence

The Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence honors the career achievements of Dr. Antonia Brancia Maxon in promoting effective EHDI programs for all newborns, infants, and young children. Dr. Maxon was a visionary in EHDI programs, beginning with her leadership in the Rhode Island Hearing Assessment Project in the late 1980's. She was one of the first to recognize the feasibility and value of universal newborn hearing screening and was a tireless advocate for connecting screening programs with timely and appropriate diagnosis and early intervention.

Her extensive contributions to creating excellent EHDI programs were abruptly ended by a tragic automobile accident in May of 2007. In memory of her contributions, an **Award for EHDI Excellence** is presented at the annual EHDI Conference to honor an individual or group of people who have made a noteworthy accomplishment that contributed to achieving excellence in EHDI programs nationally or in a particular state or region of the country.

ANTONIA BRANCIA MAXON AWARD FOR EHDI EXCELLENCE

Past Recipients of the Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence

2010 Recipients

Beth Benedict's passion is to ensure that all families with children who are deaf or hard of hearing are informed and empowered and that these children have access to high-quality services that promote success in language, literacy, and life. Beth exemplifies the best in collaboration and partnerships through her work with deaf and hearing communities. For more than twenty years she has been a mentor to families with newly identified children. Beth currently serves as the president of the American Society for Deaf Children and is a professor at Gallaudet University.

Beth has been a key figure on EHDI conference planning and proposal review committees. She regularly presents at the EHDI conference and has influenced EHDI systems to recognize and acknowledge the range of communication opportunities available to children and families. She serves as a Council on Education of the Deaf (CED) representative to the Joint Committee on Infant Hearing, is a member of the Maryland Universal Newborn Hearing Screening Advisory Council and often consults on early intervention and family involvement projects. Beth's involvement in EHDI systems improvement spans topic areas, type of audience, and venue. Her respect for and sensitivity to various points of view has earned her the esteem of colleagues across the field. As the parent of two deaf children, a member of the deaf community, and a professional in academia, her experience is broad and deep.

Albert Mehl has been a pioneer in newborn hearing screening since 1992 when he was asked to help implement a newborn hearing screening program at Boulder Community Hospital. Little did he know that this would become his second career. He was crucial in passing Colorado's newborn hearing legislation in 1997. Representing the physician's role and the importance of early identification, he helped convince legislators that newborn hearing screening was the right thing to do for all children. As a result of the legislation, a formal advisory committee was developed, and Al was selected as the chair. Twelve years later he continues to lead the advisory committee providing insight, support and practical wisdom to the ever-changing needs of EHDI programs. He serves as the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) representative on the Joint Committee on Infant Hearing and has written several articles that have been published in the AAP Journal and are quoted frequently – all of this while maintaining a full time pediatric practice. As a primary health care provider, Al has been instrumental in supporting the medical home approach, working together as a team with the audiologist, Hands & Voices parent guide and early interventionist for the benefit of the child and the family.

Vickie Thompson was the EHDI Coordinator in Colorado before the official job existed. In 1991 she initiated one of the first universal screening programs in the world at Boulder Community Hospital and became the consultant for the Colorado Department of Health to promote and support Newborn Hearing Screening programs statewide shortly thereafter. She was the Newborn Screening Coordinator at the Marion Downs Hearing Center (MDHC) and has been on the Professional Advisory Committee of the MDHC since 1996. In 1998 she was instrumental in creating the Colorado Infant Hearing Advisory Board which has led to the improvement of EHDI programs in Colorado. At that time the concept of an advisory board was unique, and Vickie's creativity and vision led to an advisory board concept, which became the model for other states. Under Vickie's leadership, Colorado consistently meets the EHDI goals set by the Joint Committee for Infant Hearing and has become a model that is emulated by many other states.

Barton G. Kids Hear Now Cochlear Implant Family Resource Center

Hearing loss is the most common type of birth defect and affects over 12,000 newborns each year. Just a little over a decade ago, a child born deaf had little hope of hearing, but today, cochlear implantation surgery can provide a child who is born deaf with the ability to hear. A comprehensive international program for cochlear implant patient care the University of Miami Ear Institute, through the aid of its Cochlear Implant Program, has helped restore hearing to more than 1,200 children and adults.

Understanding that the diagnosis of deafness can be devastating and families of hearing impaired children face unique challenges the University of Miami Ear Institute offers hope to those recently diagnosed with the



establishment of the **Barton G. Kids Hear Now Cochlear Implant Family Resource Center**. The Center and its team of experts are dedicated to providing a seamless process that takes into account the social and emotional aspects of deaf children and their families while offering the most current medical technology available. Providing state-of-theart, patient-centered services including psychological counseling, pre and post surgical consultations, mentoring, support groups and educational outreach the Center is a place where families from all walks of life can receive the resources and support they need to transition deaf children from an existence without sound to a hearing world through the use of cochlear implant technology.

Ten Years of EHDI

The first official Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) meeting was held February 11-13, 2002 at Tysons Corner in Vienna, Virginia. Since that time, significant progress has been demonstrated in identifying and providing early intervention services to deaf and hard-of-hearing infants. Data reported in 2002 (for calendar year 2000) estimated that slightly more than half of all newborns in the United States were screened for hearing loss. A decade later more than 95% of U.S. infants can be documented as having their hearing screened. However, several challenges remain such as ensuring timely diagnostic evaluation for those who do not pass the screening, enrollment in early intervention for those with diagnosed hearing loss, and the provision of culturally appropriate support services for those families. The opening plenary session of this ten-year anniversary will feature representatives of the co-sponsors of the meeting, the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and the National Center for Hearing Assessment and Management (NCHAM). Each representative will reflect on their national perspectives of where EHDI has been and what may lie ahead in the future for improving early hearing screening, diagnosis, and intervention systems for infants/young children and their families.



Bonnie Strickland

Director, Division of Children with Special Health Needs Maternal and Child Health Bureau

Dr. Strickland is the Director of the Division of Services for Children with Special Healthcare Needs (DSCSHN) in the Health Resources and Services Administration's (HRSA) Maternal and Child Health Bureau on (MCHB). Dr. Strickland administers a national system of programs designed to improve genetic services including a specific focus on Sickle Cell Disease and Hemophilia; as well as condition-specific initiatives in Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD); Traumatic Brain Injury; Early Hearing Detection and Intervention; and Access to Care for Children and Youth with Epilepsy. She holds a Doctorate in Early Childhood Education from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

John Eichwald

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) U.S. Department of Health and Human Services

John Eichwald is the Team Lead for the Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) Program within the National Center on Birth Defects and Developmental Disabilities at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta, Georgia. In this position he oversees various EHDI activities including collaboration with federal, national, and state agencies and organizations in assisting states and territories to develop standardized procedures for newborn hearing screening tracking, surveillance, data collection and management.

Louis Cooper, MD, FAAP

Past President of the American Academy of Pediatrics (2001-2002)

Dr. Cooper has served on numerous advisory bodies at the federal, state, and city level in New York, including chairmanships of the Medical Society of the State of New York Committee on Medicaid, and the Public Policy Committee (PPC) of the Pediatric Infectious Disease Society. Dr. Cooper was also the founding Co-Chairman of the Campaign for Healthy Children, best known for designing, advocating, and facilitating implementation of the Child Health Plus Program, New York's effort to guarantee health insurance for every child in the state. He continues to stay involved with a number of AAP initiatives including serving on the AAP Task Force on Improving the Effectiveness of Newborn Hearing Screening, Diagnosis, and Intervention.




Utah State University

Howard A. Rosenblum is a Senior Attorney at Equip for Equality, a nonprofit organization designated as Illinois' Protection and Advocacy entity. He has been an attorney for eighteen years, ten of which were in private practice with Monahan & Cohen. He will begin as the Chief Executive Officer of the National Association of the Deaf (NAD) in April 2011. Mr. Rosenblum has focused his legal practice in the areas of disability rights and special education. Having been profoundly deaf since age 2, he is a product of special education and seeks to improve the system. He is also the founder and board chair of the Midwest Center on Law and the Deaf (MCLD), which is dedicated to ensuring that deaf and hard of hearing people have full and equal access to lawyers and the courts. Mr. Rosenblum received his law degree from IIT Chicago-Kent College of Law (1992), and his Bachelor of Science degree in Computer Engineering from the University of Arizona (1988).

The Medical Home and EHDI

In recent years, the concept of a 'medical home' has been recognized as especially important in providing appropriate care for children with special needs and their families. The characteristics of a 'medical home' are outlined, with attention to how one can link lofty and descriptive ideas with concrete actions and measurable outcomes. A special emphasis on a 'Just-In-Time' learning model is highlighted in the area of early hearing detection and early intervention.



Albert Mehl, MD, FAAP

Chairperson, American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) Task Force on Improving Hearing Screening, Diagnosis and Intervention

Dr. Albert Mehl has been a pioneer in newborn hearing screening since 1992 when he agreed to help implement a newborn hearing screening program at Boulder Community Hospital. He was instrumental in getting Colorado's newborn hearing legislation passed in 1997 when he used his experience as a pediatrician to convince legislators that newborn hearing screening was the right thing to do for all children. He continues to provide pediatric medical care in Lafayette, Colorado, serves as the Chairperson for the AAP Task Force on Improving the Effectiveness of Newborn Hearing Screening, Diagnosis, and Intervention, and is the AAP representative to the Joint Committee on Infant Hearing (JCIH). At the 2010 National EHDI Conference he received the Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence. As a primary care physician, Dr. Mehl has successful implemented the medical home concept in his own practice using a team approach with the audiologist, Hands & Voices parent guide and early interventionist working together for the benefit of the child and the family.

EHDI & Family Support: Past, Present and Future

Maria Rodriguez


Colorado Families for Hands & Voices



During the session, attendees from each state will meet together to learn about the goals and priorities for their state's EHDI system and to coordinate attendance at workshops.

Preparing for the EHDI Conference


Transportation options to and from the airport:


North Tower M1/Street Level
