

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Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence

The Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence honors the career achievements of Dr. Antonia Brancia Maxon in promoting effective EHDI programs for all newborns, infants, and young children. Dr. Maxon was a visionary in EHDI programs, beginning with her leadership in the Rhode Island Hearing Assessment Project in the late 1980's. She was one of the first to recognize the feasibility and value of universal newborn hearing screening and was a tireless advocate for connecting screening programs with timely and appropriate diagnosis and early intervention.

Her extensive contributions to creating excellent EHDI programs were abruptly ended by a tragic automobile accident in May of 2007. In memory of her contributions, an **Award for EHDI Excellence** is presented at the EHDI Annual Meeting to honor an individual or group of people who have made a noteworthy accomplishment that contributed to achieving excellence in EHDI programs nationally or in a particular state or region of the country.

ABOUT US :::

The Parent Infant Program at the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind (FSDB) offers a statewide family-centered program for children ages 0-5 who are deaf/hard of hearing and/or blind/visually impaired. Services are provided in the family's natural environment and during daily routines. Our services are available at no cost to Florida families who have young children with documented hearing loss or bilateral vision loss.

SERVICES PROVIDED :::

Families are paired with Parent Advisors who are certified professionals. Parent Advisors are specifically trained to work with young children who have hearing or vision loss and their families. Through regular home visits, Parent Advisors address family concerns and help determine priorities. Together – families, caregivers, and Parent Advisors share information, discuss ideas and adaptations, and monitor the child's progress. The purpose is to enhance each family's ability to encourage their child to become a participating

family member and a part of the larger community.

Georgia Pathway to Language and Literacy for Children Who Are Deaf/Hard of Hearing

In the fall of 2010, a group of stakeholders established the Georgia Pathway to Language and Literacy to advance the literacy proficiency of Georgia's children who are deaf or hard of hearing (D/HH). This innovative project has undertaken the development of an on-line community of practice to support the achievement of grade-level reading proficiency by the end of third grade for all Georgia students with hearing loss, regardless of their communication modality. The commitment to achieving such outcomes for children with hearing loss supports the vision statement of the Georgia Early Education Alliance for Ready Students, i.e., "By 2020, Georgia will be a national leader ensuring that every child is ready to succeed in kindergarten and on a path to read to learn by third grade." The implementation of a Community of Practice includes a professional network, a knowledge center and systematic mentoring to support professionals' knowledge, and skill building for language and literacy development of D/HH students:

The project will be discussed by Brenda Fitzgerald, Kenney Moore, and Comer Yates. As Commissioner of the Georgia Department of Public Health, Dr. Fitzgerald is on a mission

to close the "30 million word gap." A study by researchers Betty Hart and Todd Risley found that some children heard thirty million fewer words by their 4th birthdays than others, leading to demonstrated lower achievement. Fitzgerald has helped mobilize resources to address the gap as a way to help improve the early education problem in Georgia today. In addition to the Department of Public Health, Georgia Tech, and Emory University's Marcus Autism Center as well as its School of Nursing are all on board. The United Way of Greater Atlanta has pledged \$500,000 a year for three years to the program. The simple practice of providing a rich language environment to babies and toddlers provides nourishment for their brains, setting them up for better performance in school, and even a higher IQ.

Experience of a Deaf Pediatrician Working with Families in a Deaf Medical Home

Dr. Robert Nutt is a pediatrician who cares for families in both a primary pediatrics clinic and a developmental-behavioral pediatrics specialty clinic. Dr. Nutt's lifelong experience with bilateral hearing loss has made him a role model for his patients and their families. His proficiency in spoken English and American Sign Language (ASL) allow him to connect in unique ways with families and children. Dr. Nutt will reflect on his life experience as an individual with hearing loss and describe his experience caring for children and families through the differences between four permutations of parent-child dyads (Hearing/Deaf parents, Hearing/Deaf child). This session will provide unique insight into the complexities faced by parents and professionals providing primary care for families affected by hearing loss with an emphasis on interdisciplinary, child-centered decision making. Attendees of this session will be able to:

- · Relate to the insights offered from a pediatrician with hearing loss
- · Integrate strategies for early childhood development and decision-making from a pediatrician with hearing loss
- · Describe the differences between four permutations of hearing-deaf parent-child dyad



Robert C. Nutt

University of Rochester, Division of Neurodevelopmental and Behavioral Pediatrics

Dr. Robert Nutt graduated from Dartmouth College and received his medical degree from the Geisel School of Medicine at Dartmouth. He served on the Newborn Hearing Screening

Task Force for the New Hampshire, helping to establish the universal newborn hearing screening program in that state. Dr. Nutt completed his Pediatric Residency training followed by clinical fellowships in Academic General Pediatrics and Developmental and Behavioral Pediatrics at the University of Rochester Medical Center. Dr. Nutt has cared for families in both a primary pediatrics clinic and a developmental-behavioral pediatrics specialty clinic. He developed an ambulatory pediatric clinic that provides direct care to Deaf and hard of hearing patients and families as part of a Patient-Centered Medical Home at the University of Rochester. Dr. Nutt has been director of the Deaf Health Pathway at the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry, teaching medical students about caring for Deaf patients and other special populations. He serves on the Monroe County (NY) LEICC Task Force on Childhood Hearing and is a member of the American Academy of Pediatrics Leadership Team for Early Hearing Detection and Intervention. His life-long personal experience with hearing loss and proficiency in spoken English and American Sign Language allow him to appreciate the importance of early childhood language acquisition.
